# Exhibition "Footwear of Old Slavs"

### THE SHOE MUSEUM IN ZLÍN

A permanent exhibition from the collections of the Museum of Southeastern Moravia finds itself in the entrance to the industrial estate in the center of the city. Through more than one thousand exhibits it will familiarize visitors with the history of footwear and also its present state, with the development of footwear manufacturing and the history of the shoemakercs craft. The collection follows the development of footwear from the oldest period of the Czech history to the present. The earliest period is depicted through replicas. The oldest originals date back to the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

A unique collection is the one dealing with the footwear of foreign nations. There are various types of footwear from all the continents of the world. Perhaps the most precious is the collection of small textile shoes from the period of the Chinese Empire. A very interesting collection is also that of atamansqshoes bought in 1911 by the last owner of the mansion in Buchlov, then a collection of African sandals and a large collection of footwear from India. For the viewer, the most attractive exhibits are sandals made of emu ostrich feathers and human hair, which served ritual purposes in central Australia. The most extensive and probably the most compact of the Shoe Museum collections is a collection of shoes from the Ba a company production. It follows the development of the production from the foundation of the factory in 1894 to 1945 when the shoemaking factory was nationalized.

# **Footwear of the Old Slavs** (panel exhibition devoted to the footwear of the inhabitants of Great Moravia)

Due to the fact that in our territory there are no real records that would describe the footwear of the inhabitants of the Great Moravian Empire, a comparative study of the preserved footwear from the period between the 8<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> century was conducted, namely from the deposits in Russia, Poland and Germany. It is probable that the footwear of the old Slavs in our territory was either identical or similar in type to the footwear found in these neighboring countries. The exhibition will be presented in the form of pictorial documentation. The exhibition takes place from 1<sup>st</sup> June to 30<sup>th</sup> August 2012.
